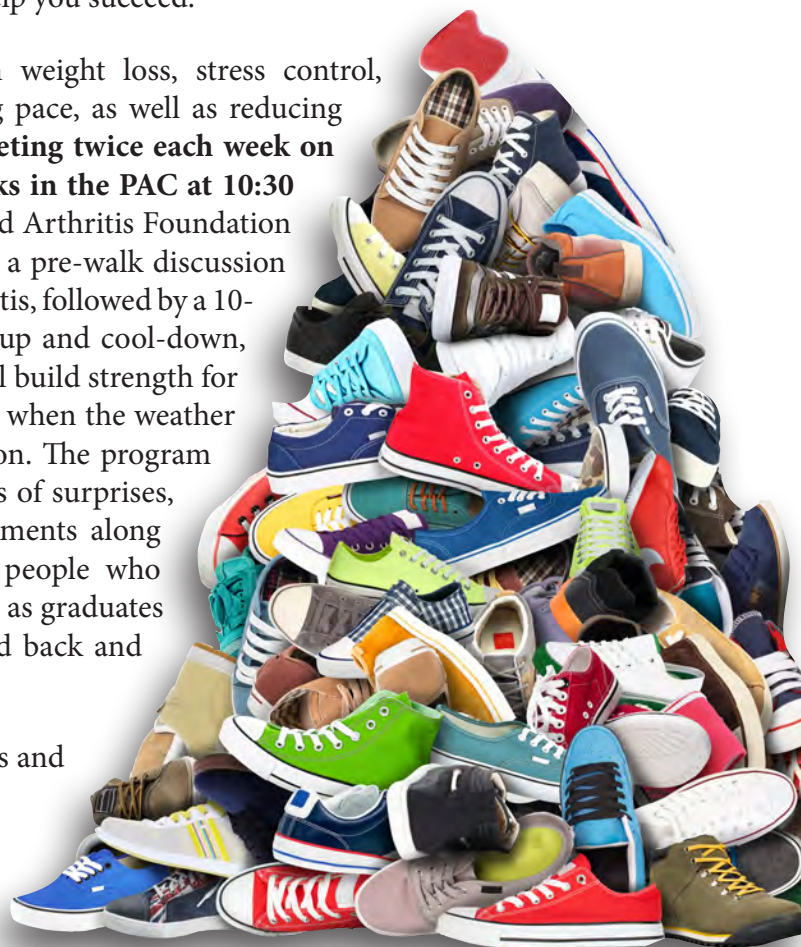

It has been fun adding up everyone's steps to see how far we can go together. It's a close race with the top mileage participants only a few miles apart.

Speaking of walking—Are you looking for a way to keep your exercise program going? Would you like to begin a walking program? If you can you walk at least ten minutes and desire to improve your overall health and well-being, the **Arthritis Foundation Walk with Ease Program** will teach you how to safely make physical activity part of your everyday life. **Walk with Ease** offers support, information and tools to help you succeed.

Walking has been proven to help with weight loss, stress control, increasing strength, balance, and walking pace, as well as reducing pain. **Classes will begin March 23rd meeting twice each week on Mondays and Wednesdays for nine weeks in the PAC at 10:30 am** and led by Mary Hand who is a trained Arthritis Foundation walking leader. Each meeting begins with a pre-walk discussion covering a topic related to exercise or arthritis, followed by a 10- to 40-minute walk that includes a warm-up and cool-down, stretches, and take home exercises that will build strength for walking. We will walk inside to begin and when the weather improves walking outside will be an option. The program will include a very helpful guidebook, lots of surprises, good camaraderie and special encouragements along the way. We are especially looking for people who want to begin an exercise program, as well as graduates of the program who are always welcomed back and encouraged to bring a friend.

Congratulations to Bill Hinkle of RehabCare

Please join us in honoring a very special employee this month! His name is Bill Hinkle, PhD.,CCC/SLP. Bill is celebrating his 50th year of being a Doctor of Speech Language Pathology. Bill graduated from Bloomsburg State University in 1965 with his bachelor's degree in speech. After graduation, Bill accepted a position in public schools as a speech therapist. He enjoyed his job in public schools even though most weeks he saw over 180 students. After a year or so of working in the field, Bill decided to pursue higher education in his field.



Bill started a doctoral program at Purdue University in La Fayette, IN toward the end of 1966. At the time, the government was funding higher education more heavily and Bill was able to get paid to go to school; the NDEA was the funding foundation. Bill felt very fortunate for the funding and to this day he is thankful for how far he has come in his field. Bill graduated with his doctorate in 1971; he soon became a faculty member at Bowling Green State University in Ohio as the director of clinical services. Bill worked as the director from 1971 to 1975. After leaving Bowling Green, Bill accepted a position with New York State National Technical Institute as a deaf educator. Bill worked in New York for 5 years and then decided that deaf education was not for him. Bill wanted to continue "climbing the ladder" in his field, so he soon accepted a new position with Indiana University Northwest as the director of allied health programs. Bill served

as the director of allied health programs for around 4 years. At this time, one of his close family members challenged him to stay with an institution for more than 10 years. Bill accepted the challenge and also accepted a job in Memphis, Tennessee at the University of Tennessee health science center as the Dean. Bill stayed with University of Tennessee for over 24 years. In 2008, he retired, but soon realized he wanted to continue doing what he loves for a little bit longer. He worked with Broadway Healthcare for around a year and then worked for Arkansas State University for 3 years.

Finally, Bill took a position with Rehabcare in 2013 and he is still currently working with the company. Bill is highly admired in his field and also by his company. When asked what his favorite job was, Bill said, "Honestly, working with Rehabcare is probably my favorite job, because I am doing exactly what I love and I am only responsible for myself and my patients in this line of work." He also told us that working with patients on swallowing techniques and working with memory loss patients are two of his favorite tasks to do on the job; he likes tangible results.

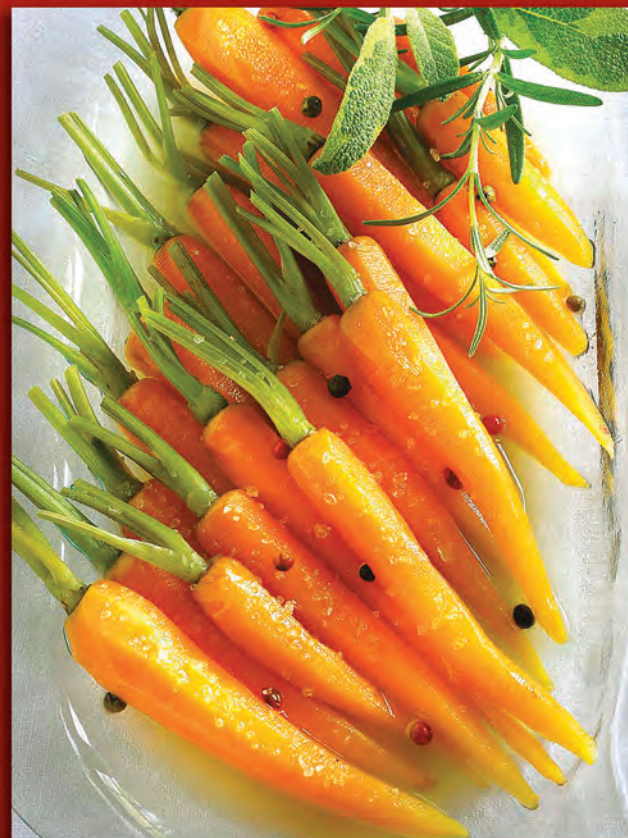

to have his limousine driver take her for a ride to clear her head. She was an avid reader of the Hollywood Reporter and Variety Magazines, and spotted an announcement for an upcoming movie "George White Scandals". Maybe this was her chance to make it big. Stella was one of hundreds of girls to be interviewed, but couldn't meet the basic requirement to be a professional dancer; she had never had dance lessons. Nevertheless, she was selected to join a troupe that toured across the United States, from California to Boston, MA and the East Coast and down through the Southern States, closing in San Antonio, TX with a glittering party held at the Grey Moss Inn.

Starstruck no longer, she left the California movie scene and settled in Memphis; as she puts it "she grew up". We know her as Stella Ely, a Kirby Pines resident who recalls friends in the movie industry and who in later years, became a mother, grandmother, and leader of Memphis-based community ministries. She married Dr. William E. Hurt in 1946, and they had 5 children. He passed away in 1965. In 1972, Stella married Richard Ely and the blended family grew to 8 children, 13 grandchildren, and 11 great grands. She and Richard established the Fountain of Life Ministries, and were diligent in exploring additional volunteer opportunities. Richard passed away in 1999.

Youthful dreams – we've all had them. As adults, we have visions of what can be done to provide succor to those in need. Both dreams and visions have their place in our lives, and what we do with them give shape to who we ultimately are. Stella had her dreams and lived them, so to speak. As an adult, she understood the broader purpose of her life and embraced the efforts required to bear fruit, not for "self" only but for the larger community of which we all are a part. Well done, Stella.

LIVING THE DREAM

For star-struck wannabees, Tinseltown was the place to be. The place to become known, to be Somebody! So it was with a young girl of 16 years of age, Stella Brown, daughter of Stella Jones Brown and John Preston Brown.

Determined to establish herself in Hollywood, Stella moved to California to live with an older sister. Acting was not her strong interest but, rather, the production side of the movie industry. In 1941, Stella and her sister went to San Diego's Del Mar Race Track, and were invited to visit the Track's Turf Club. It was here that Stella got her first 'taste of fame by association' – meeting the famous actors William Powell and Pat O'Brian and, later, Donald O'Connor who sang to her. She found work at Universal Studios, working initially in the mailroom; a fortuitous position because her delivery route included daily contact with the office staffs of the Studio's President and Vice President, and on-set homes of Dianna Durbin and Charles Boyer both of whom signed autographs for the starstruck young woman. Attending her first Studio Christmas party gave Stella her first taste of "spirits", but the Vice President was kind enough

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

I STAY NEAR THE DOOR

Samuel Shoemaker, an Episcopal minister in the mid 20th Century, was considered one of the 10 greatest preachers in America. He was listed with greats like Dr. Billy Graham and Norman Vincent Peale. He was co-founder with Bill Wilson of AA (Alcoholics Anonymous) contributing much to the steps and spiritual principles of this work. As pastor of the Calvary Protestant Episcopal Church in New York City and later serving in Pittsburgh, Rev. Shoemaker impacted many across America.

Christmas, 1958 he published "So I Stand By The Door." It was subtitled "An Apology For My Life." Apology didn't mean what the word symbolizes today...being sorry for one's life. It meant a grand statement of one's actions and accomplishments. It was a declaration of the paths and goals followed. Shoemaker's poem was also titled "So I Stand Near The Door."

Listen to what he said:

*I stay near the door.
I neither go too far in, nor stay too far out,
The door is the most important thing in the world--
It is the door through which men walk when they find God.
There's no use my going way inside, and staying there,
When so many are still outside, and they, as much as I,
Crave to know where the door is.
And all that so many ever find
Is only the wall where a door ought to be,
They creep along the wall like blind men,
With outstretched, groping hands,
Feeling for a door, knowing there must be a door,
Yet they never find it...
So I stay near the door.*

*The most tremendous thing in the world
Is for men to find that door—the door to God.
The most important thing any man can do
Is to take hold of one of those blind, groping hands,
And put it on the latch—the latch that only clicks
And opens to the man's own touch.
Men die outside that door, as starving beggars die
On cold nights in cruel cities in the dead of winter--
Die for want of what is within their grasp.
They live on the other side of it—
live because they have not found it.
Nothing else matters compared to helping them find it,
And open it, and walk in, and find Him...
So I stay near the door.*

*I admire the people who go way in.
But I wish they would not forget how it was
Before they got in. Then they would be able to help
The people who have not even found the door,
Or the people who want to run away again from God.
You can go in too deeply, and stay in too long,
And forget the people outside the door.
As for me, I shall take my old accustomed place,
Near enough to God to hear Him, and know He is there,
But not so far from men as not to hear them,
And remember they are there too.
Where? Outside the door--
Thousands of them, millions of them.
But—more important for me--
One of them, two of them, ten of them,
Whose hands I am intended to put on the latch,
So I shall stay by the door and wait
For those who seek it.
I had rather be a doorkeeper...
So I stay near the door.*

What a statement of life! We should all be doorkeepers. We who have found the way in have both an opportunity and obligation for others who are seeking. We can't go inside and forget those who still are looking for the way in. No greater privilege can be ours than to place their hands on the latch and help them in. Let's always be open to hear God and the voices of those who are still outside. Like Samuel Shoemaker let's stay near the door! (Psalm 84:10)
