



It's odd to say Arthritis Awareness, because if you have one of the over 100 medical conditions that fall under the diagnosis of Arthritis you are probably aware of arthritis everyday and every night. While no cure for arthritis has been developed yet, with much research, medical science has improved its understanding for the causes of arthritis and better treatments including new medications for pain and inflammation relief have been developed. Exercise that emphasizes stretching, strengthening, and cardiovascular has an important role in the improvement and continuing function of daily activities. The Arthritis Foundation sponsors research, educational programs, exercise programs, public awareness and advocacy efforts in Congress. Through their bi-monthly magazine, Arthritis Today, they keep people informed on new products, diet, exercise and medications.

Arthritis affects over 50 million people in the U.S. and two-thirds are under the age of 65. Over 300,000 families deal with arthritis in children under the age of 16. The Arthritis Foundation has been fighting juvenile arthritis and supporting families for more than 60 years. Every year they invest more than \$4.5 million in outreach and research that advances treatments and will lead to a cure. Four of our exercise classes are sponsored through the Arthritis Foundation: Tai Chi Mondays @ 2 in the PAC, Basic Water Aerobics on Tuesday/Thursdays at 9:30, Sit and Stand Class Tuesday/Thursdays in the Arts & Crafts Room at 11 and our Walk with Ease Class offered twice a year. Interest in the Arthritis Foundation exercise programs brought Mary Hand to teach classes at Kirby Pines three years ago. Kirby Pines has since become a flagship organization for the Arthritis Foundation.

In support of the Arthritis Foundation, we are planning a Bake sale on May 21 from 9 to 3 and our own Walk to Cure here at Kirby Pines on May 28 at 10:30. We need your help. Living ARTHRITIS with ARTHRITIS



Warren Grant

CHARISMATIC COMMUNICATOR

A talent for drawing people, even strangers, to listen to his message – how does a particular strength emerge in a person and become the driving force in plans to "make a difference"? So it was with Warren Grant, a well-known resident of Kirby Pines; one who is intelligent and shrewd; a talented piano player; a tireless worker for the Church; and a devoted father of 3 children and grandfather of 9 children.

Warren was born in Buffalo, Missouri to Lora Scott and Floyd Grant. His parents had a son and a daughter. His Dad was a farmer and merchant but his heart belonged to a lifelong ministry of 30 years as Pastor in the Assembly of God Church. During these years, his Mom supported her husband's pastoring through the Women's Ministries; she also attended Southwestern Missouri University, focusing on Education, and taught grades one through eight. Rules of conduct for Warren and his sister, Wanda, covered avoidance of movies, dancing, make-up, alcohol, smoking, gaming, and

carnivals - no frivolous or sinful activities permitted. Warren went to Central Bible College, earning a BA degree in Bible studies. He was a restless young man in the Buffalo, Missouri environment, yearning to test his mettle in venues unknown to his parents and fellow church members. He traveled to many cities across the U.S. to serve as Church Minister, staff pastor, choreographer and producer of successful stage presentations. He formed, directed, and performed in a music quartet. When the group caught the attention of the Christ Ambassadors in Springfield, Missouri, Warren negotiated a one-year contract for the quartet, receiving \$30 per week plus expenses. Growing exposure to, and public acclaim for the quartet was a major step to future endeavors.

The First Assembly of God Church in Memphis, TN offered Warren the position of Youth Pastor. His duties included home visits, and scripting and performing on the Church radio and TV shows. While pastoring a start-up church in Knoxville, TN, Warren accepted the position of staff pastor in Sacramento, California; remaining for 12 years. He had a strong natural interest in writing, serving as Editor of his college newspaper, he wrote for the Memphis Mirror; for the Voice of Bethel; and was an announcer for the Our Story TV Program. In 1957 Warren and David Peters formed The Singing Christmas Tree – a 100 voice choir. The professional presentations at Bethel Temple Church; later, at Governor's Hall; then Sacramento Memorial Auditorium drew growing crowds reaching 15,000 yearly. In 1983, Charles Trammel invited Warren to join the Kirby Pines Retirement Community Board of Directors. He left this position in 1985 to develop another Retirement Community in Lakeland, Florida. What do we make of Warren's drive to further the work of the Church? From his point of view, his words and actions are in sync with his understanding of

what is expected of those who hold themselves out as Believers. Some would disagree with his view; others salute it.

M u l t i talented, driven, and committed - Warren Grant, our friend and colleague.

The young boy in 1927 picture is 5 years old. He lived at 1425 Goodbar in midtown Memphis. He doesn't look very happy being in a cart pulled by a handsome shaggy goat – note that he's holding onto both sides of the cart. Note also his intense stare at the photographer. Back in the day, roving photographers with their goat carts were commonly seen in Memphis neighborhoods, looking to take a picture of a child in the goat cart - a picture that would catch the attention and interest of the Commercial Appeal editors, putting together the next day's issue.

Be sure to also take a close look at the back of the picture – note the name and address of the company that did the professional framing of the photograph. Old Summer Avenue does not exist today – so you know what took its place?

Do you know that lad in the goat cart is a noted General Sessions Court Judge? Do you know that he is the younger brother of the Kirby Pines Librarian, Betsy French's? Do you know that he is a resident of our community?

Morgan Fowler is the child in this photograph. Judge Fowler was a General Sessions Court Judge until his retirement from the Bench in 1986. He and his wife, Betty moved to Kirby Pines in 2013.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

LLVING BY DYING

James Emery White has a challenging description of one of the most dedicated and inspiring men of the World War II era, Dietrich Bonhoeffer.

"Bonhoeffer, (who was born at the beginning of the 20th Century -1906and only lived to be 39), was a German pastor who lived under the dark shadow of the swastika in Nazi Germany. Speaking out against Hitler's atrocities from the beginning, Bonhoeffer was arrested for his role in the resistance movement and was executed on April 9, 1945, by special order of Heinrich Himmler...six years prior to his imprisonment he wrote 'When Christ calls a man, He bids him come and die.' From the beginning of the Nazi ascension to power in 1933, Bonhoeffer launched himself into the fray of protest, particularly against the insidious rise of anti-Semitism...For Bonhoeffer the resistance was not political but spiritual. It was a matter of discipleship. His allegiance was to 'a Lord who outweighed the Fuhrer,' knowing that only such a lordship and such a radical discipleship could trump the claims and manipulation of the German state.

Writing to a fellow theologian Reinhold Niebuhr about those who encouraged him to leave Germany, Bonhoeffer was adamant: 'I will have no right to participate in the reconstruction of Christian life in Germany after the War if I do not share the trials of this time with my people.'

His last weeks were spent in various Gestapo prisons...ending in Flossenburg. One of his fellow prisoners, and English officer, wrote that Bonhoeffer 'was one of the very few persons I have ever met for whom God was real and always near... On Sunday, April 8, 1945, Pastor Bonhoeffer conducted a little service of worship and spoke to us in a way that went to the heart of all of us. He found just the right words to express the spirit of our imprisonment, the thoughts and the resolutions it had brought us. He had hardly ended his last prayer when the door opened and two civilians entered. They said, 'Pastor Bonhoeffer, come with us.' That had one meaning for all prisoners—the gallows. We said goodby to him. He took me aside: 'This is the end, but for me it is the beginning of life.' The next day he was hanged in Flossenburg."

One month later, on May 8, 1945, Germany made its unconditional surrender and the War was over. It was so close. Without Himmler's special order Bonhoeffer might have survived, but he was convinced of the truth of "Living By Dying."

Similar things are happening now in many places. Paul's nearly 2000 year old statement is descriptive of so many men, women and children scattered

worldwide, "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain." (Philippians 1:21)

How great is the need for new Bonhoeffers. Are we willing to stand against rampant evil spreading often unchecked all around us? Are we prepared to participate in the spiritual battle raging? Are we committed to die if necessary for justice, morality and the things that rightly should last? Will anyone ever write about us and our choices? Will our lives leave much of an impact?

Now is the time. This is the moment. The decision must be made.


